# ON THE APPROXIMATION ORDER OF PRINCIPAL SHIFT-INVARIANT SUBSPACES OF $L_{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right)$ 

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#### Abstract

For $1 \leq p \leq \infty$, sufficient conditions on the generators $\left\{\phi_{h}\right\}_{h>0}$ are given which ensure that the $h$-dilates of the shift-invariant space generated by $\phi_{h}$ provide $L_{p^{-}}$ approximation of order $k>0$. Examples where $\phi_{h}$ is an exponential box spline or certain dilates of the Gaussian $e^{-\left.l \cdot\right|^{2}}$ are considered; it is shown that our sufficient condition then provides an optimal lower bound on their approximation order.


## 1. Introduction

Let $d \in \mathbb{N}:=\{1,2, \ldots\} \Gamma$ and let $C:=(-1 / 2 \ldots 1 / 2)^{d}$ denote the open unit cube in $\mathbb{R}^{d}$. Following [19] Tdefine

$$
\mathcal{L}_{p}:=\left\{f \in L_{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right):\|f\|_{\mathcal{L}_{p}}:=\left\|\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}}|f(\cdot-j)|\right\|_{L_{p}(C)}<\infty\right\}, \quad 1 \leq p \leq \infty .
$$

Note that $\|f\|_{L_{1}}=\|f\|_{\mathcal{L}_{1}} \leq\|f\|_{\mathcal{L}_{p}} \leq\|f\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}}$ whenever $1 \leq p \leq \bar{p} \leq \infty$. It was shown in [19] that if $\phi \in \mathcal{L}_{p} \Gamma$ then the semi-discrete convolution operator $\phi *^{\prime}$ is a bounded operator from $\ell_{p}$ into $L_{p} \Gamma$ where $\phi *^{\prime} c:=\phi *_{1}^{\prime} c$ and

$$
\phi *_{h}^{\prime} c:=\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}} c(h j) \phi(\cdot / h-j), \quad h>0 .
$$

We define $S_{p}(\phi)$ to be the image of $\phi *^{\prime}$ on $\ell_{p}$ :

$$
S_{p}(\phi):=\left\{\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}} c(j) \phi(\cdot-j): c \in \ell_{p}\right\} .
$$

$S_{p}(\phi)$ is said to be a shift-invariant space because $f(\cdot-j) \in S_{p}(\phi)$ whenever $f \in S_{p}(\phi)$ and $j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}$. Since $S_{p}(\phi)$ is 'generated' by the shifts (i.e. integer translates) of a single function $\Gamma$ we call it a principal shift-invariant space. There are $\Gamma$ in the literature $\Gamma$ a number

[^0]of ways of 'generating' a shift-invariant space from a single function $\phi$ or a collection of functions $\Phi$. When the details are unimportant we will simply write $S(\phi)$ or $S(\Phi)$ to denote this space. Shift-invariant (SI) spaces and principal shift-invariant (PSI) spaces are important in many areas of approximation theory including the study of multivariate splines $\Gamma$ radial basis function theory C sampling theory $\Gamma$ wavelets $\Gamma$ and subdivision schemes.

We can dilate any PSI space $S(\phi)$ by the parameter $h>0$ to obtain

$$
S^{h}(\phi):=\{f(\cdot / h): f \in S(\phi)\} .
$$

The directed family $\left(S^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ is called a ladder of PSI spaces. When one has in hand a ladder of PSI spaces $\left(S^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ Гa standard problem Гand one which has received considerable attention in the literature $\Gamma$ is the determination of its $L_{p}$-approximation power; i.e. the determination of the rate of decay of $\operatorname{dist}\left(f, S^{h}(\phi) ; L_{p}\right)($ as $h \rightarrow 0)$ for sufficiently smooth $f \in L_{p}$. Here

$$
\operatorname{dist}(f, A ; X):=\inf _{x \in A}\|f-x\|_{X}
$$

In the literature $\Gamma$ the statement $\Gamma$ " $\left(S^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $\gamma$ " has various definitions ${ }^{1}$; the essential ingredient is that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{dist}\left(f, S^{h}(\phi) ; L_{p}\right)=O\left(h^{\gamma}\right) \quad \text { for all sufficiently smooth } f \in L_{p} \tag{1.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

Strang and Fix [34] have shown (see also [33] $\mathbb{T} 12] \mathrm{T}[2]$ ) that if $\phi$ is a compactly supported $L_{2}$ function $\Gamma$ then the ladder $\left(S_{2}^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ provides "controlled" $L_{2}$-approximation of order $k \in \mathbb{N}$ if and only if $\widehat{\phi}(0) \neq 0$ and one of the following two equivalent conditions holds:

\begin{align*}
& \forall f \in \Pi_{k-1} \exists g \in \Pi_{k-1} \text { such that } f=\phi *^{\prime} g ;  \tag{1.2}\\
& D^{\alpha} \widehat{\phi}(j)=0 \quad \forall|\alpha|<k, j \in 2 \pi \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0 . \tag{1.3}
\end{align*}
$$

The qualifier "controlled" $\Gamma$ as used above $\Gamma$ places a restriction on how the approximations to a smooth function can be drawn from $S_{2}^{h}(\phi)$ as $h \rightarrow 0$; hence $\Gamma$ "controlled" approximation is stronger than unqualified approximation. Conditions (1.3) are now known as the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k$. These conditions had previously been considered for $d=1$ by Schoenberg [33]. Clarifications and extensions of [34] can be found in Dahmen and Micchelli [11] and Jia [17]. Finally「de Boor and Jia [7] 「using "local" rather than "controlled" approximation Гextended the $L_{2}$ result of [34] to $L_{p}$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \infty$. Later $\Gamma$ interest in removing the compact support assumption on the generator $\phi$ developed and was investigated by Jackson [16] ГBuhmann [10] [Light and Cheney [25] ГJia and Lei [18] $\Gamma$ and Halton and Light [15]. The following was proved in [18].
Theorem 1.4. Let $\phi \in L_{\infty}$ satisfy for some $\delta>0$ and $k \in \mathbb{N}$
(ii) $\quad \phi(x)=\lim _{\varepsilon \rightarrow 0} \varepsilon^{-d} \int_{x+\varepsilon C} \phi \quad$ for all $x \in \mathbb{R}^{d}$.

[^1]Then, for $1 \leq p \leq \infty$, the ladder $\left(S_{p}^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ provides "controlled" $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k$ if and only if $\widehat{\phi}(0) \neq 0$ and the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k$ are satisfied.

Here the "control" is a combination of that used in [34] and the "localness" used in [7]. Note that the compact support assumption of [34] $\Gamma[11] \Gamma$ and [7] has been replaced by the decay assumption (i) which $\Gamma$ incidentally $\Gamma$ becomes stronger as the approximation order $k$ increases. All of the above mentioned papers employ a technique known as Quasiinterpolation/Polynomial Reproduction for their error analysis. Note that Polynomial Reproduction $\Gamma$ as described in (1.2) $\Gamma$ requires that $\phi *^{\prime} g$ be well defined for $g \in \Pi_{k-1}$; hence the need for something like condition (i). In 1991「de Boor and Ron [8] were able to completely overcome condition (i) by performing their error analysis entirely in the Fourier transformed domain. Moreover $\Gamma$ their results applied to a more general situation which we now describe.

The ladder $\left(S^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ is known as a stationary ladder of PSI spaces because it is obtained by dilating the same PSI space $S(\phi)$. More generally we may useГas the $h$-entry of our ladder $\Gamma$ the $h$-dilate of an $h$-dependent PSI space $S\left(\phi_{h}\right)$ to obtain a non-stationary ladder $\left(S^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$. While in the stationary case properties of the ladder are hoped to be analyzed in terms of corresponding properties of the single generator $\phi \Gamma$ we need $\Gamma$ in the non-stationary case $\Gamma$ to inspect the entire family of generators $\left(\phi_{h}\right)_{h}$.

We can now state a sample from [8].
Theorem 1.5. Let $\left.\left(\phi_{h}\right)_{h \in(0 . .} h_{0}\right]$ be a family of functions in $\mathcal{L}_{\infty}$ which satisfy $\widehat{\phi}_{h} \neq 0$ on all of $\delta C$ for some $\delta>0$. If

$$
\sup _{h \in\left(0 . . h_{0}\right]} \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0}\left\|\frac{\widehat{\phi}_{h}(\cdot+2 \pi j)}{\left(h^{k}+|\cdot|^{k}\right) \widehat{\phi}_{h}}\right\|_{L_{\infty}(\delta C)}<\infty,
$$

then $\left(S_{\infty}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{\infty}$-approximation of order $k$.
Proof. [8; §2.5].
Note that the only decay assumption imposed on $\phi_{h}$ is the mild assumption $\phi_{h} \in \mathcal{L}_{\infty}$. Following this result $\Gamma$ de $\operatorname{Boor} \Gamma$ DeVore $\Gamma$ and Ron [4] considered the case $p=2$ where they were able to give a complete characterization of closed SI subspaces of $L_{2}$ which provide $L_{2}$-approximation of order $k>0$. Their results apply to non-stationary ladders of SI spaces and they make no decay assumptions on the generators. Kyriazis [21] $\Gamma$ in turn considered stationary PSI spaces for the case $1<p<\infty$. Sufficient conditions on the generator $\phi \in L_{p}$ are given which $\Gamma$ when satisfied $\Gamma$ ensure that the stationary ladder $\left(S^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k>0$. Again $\Gamma$ no explicit decay assumptions are made on the generator $\phi$.

In the present paper $\Gamma$ we are concerned with providing lower bounds on the $L_{p}$-approximation order $(1 \leq p \leq \infty)$ of non-stationary ladders of PSI spaces under the mild decay assumption that the generators belong to $\mathcal{L}_{p}$. An outline is as follows:
In $\S 2$ Twe define our notion of $L_{p}$-approximation order $\Gamma$ and we state our main results. The proofs of these results comprise $\S 5$ and $\S 6$. These results are applied to non-stationary ladders of PSI spaces generated by exponential box splines and dilates of the Gaussian in
$\S 3$ and $\S 4$ Trespectively. The particularly long proof of a proposition in $\S 3$ is postponed until $\S 8$. In $\S 7$ Tside conditions are given under which the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k$ are sufficient to ensure that the stationary ladder $\left(S_{p}^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k$.

Throughout this paper $\Gamma|x|:=|x|_{2}$ denotes the Euclidean norm of $x \in \mathbb{R}^{d}$ while for multi-indices $\alpha \in\{0,1,2, \ldots\}^{d} \Gamma|\alpha|:=|\alpha|_{1}:=\sum_{i=1}^{d}\left|\alpha_{i}\right|$. For open $\Omega \subseteq \mathbb{R}^{d} \Gamma 1 \leq p \leq \infty$ and $m \in \mathbb{Z}_{+}:=\{0,1,2, \ldots\}$ the Sobolev spaces $W_{p}^{m}(\Omega)$ are defined by

$$
W_{p}^{m}(\Omega):=\left\{f:\|f\|_{W_{p}^{m}(\Omega)}:=\left(\sum_{|\alpha| \leq m}\left\|D^{\alpha} f\right\|_{L_{p}(\Omega)}^{p}\right)^{1 / p}<\infty\right\}
$$

with the usual modification when $p=\infty$. Corresponding to each $\alpha \in \mathbb{Z}_{+}^{d}$ is the power function ()$^{\alpha}: \mathbb{R}^{d} \rightarrow \mathbb{C}$ defined by

$$
()^{\alpha}: x \mapsto x^{\alpha}:=\prod_{i=1}^{d} x(i)^{\alpha(i)}
$$

The space of polynomials of total degree at most $k$ is denoted $\Pi_{k}$. The open unit ball in $\mathbb{R}^{d}$ is denoted by $B:=\left\{x \in \mathbb{R}^{d}:|x|<1\right\}$. For $f \in L_{1}:=L_{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right) \Gamma$ we denote its Fourier transform by

$$
\widehat{f}(x):=\int_{\mathbb{R}^{d}} e_{-x}(t) f(t) d t
$$

where $e_{x}$ denotes the complex exponential given by

$$
e_{x}(t):=e^{i x \cdot t}
$$

The Fourier transform extends by duality to the space of tempered distributions. The inverse Fourier transform of a tempered distribution $f$ is denoted $f^{\vee}$. The collection of compactly supported $C^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right)$ functions is denoted by $C_{c}^{\infty}$ and their Fourier transforms by $\widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}}$. All derivatives of functions are to be understood as distributional. We use the symbol const to denote generic constants. It always denotes a real value in the interval $(0 \ldots \infty)$ and depends only on its arguments. Its value may change with each occurence. When using the scaling parameter $h$ as in $\left(S^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ Гit is asssumed without further mention that $h \in\left(0 \ldots h_{0}\right]$ and $h_{0} \in(0 \ldots 1]$.

## 2. The Main Results

In order to make precise the notion $\Gamma$ " $L_{p}$-approximation of order $\gamma$ " $\Gamma$ we need to specify which functions $f \in L_{p}$ are sufficiently smooth. This will be the Besov space $B_{p}^{\gamma, 1}$ which we now define. Let $\eta \in \widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}}$ satisfy $\hat{\eta}=1$ on a neighborhood of the origin $\Gamma$ and for tempered distributions $f$ Гdefine

$$
f_{k}:= \begin{cases}(\widehat{\eta}(2 \cdot) \hat{f})^{\vee}, & \text { if } k=0  \tag{2.1}\\ \left(\left(\widehat{\eta}\left(2^{1-k} \cdot\right)-\widehat{\eta}\left(2^{2-k} \cdot\right)\right) \hat{f}\right)^{\vee}, & \text { if } k>0\end{cases}
$$

For $1 \leq p \leq \infty \Gamma \gamma \geq 0 \Gamma 1 \leq q \leq \infty \Gamma$ the Besov space $B_{p}^{\gamma, q}$ (see [26]) can be defined as the collection of all tempered distributions $f$ for which

$$
\|f\|_{B_{p}^{\gamma, q}(\eta)}:=\left(\sum_{k=0}^{\infty} 2^{\gamma k}\left\|f_{k}\right\|_{L_{p}}^{q}\right)^{1 / q}<\infty,
$$

with the usual modification when $q=\infty$. It is known that $B_{p}^{\gamma, q}$ is a Banach space $\Gamma$ and as such $\Gamma$ is independent of the choice of $\eta$ (i.e. different choices of $\eta$ yield equivalent norms). We mention the following continuous imbeddings (cf. [26]; p. 62):

& B_{p}^{\gamma, q^{\prime}} \hookrightarrow B_{p}^{\gamma_{1}, q_{1}}, \quad \text { if } \gamma_{1}<\gamma \text { or } \gamma_{1}=\gamma, q_{1} \geq q ; \\
& B_{p}^{k, 1} \hookrightarrow W_{p}^{k}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right) \hookrightarrow B_{p}^{k, \infty}, \quad \text { if } k \in \mathbb{Z}_{+} ; \\
& B_{p}^{\gamma, 1} \hookrightarrow \mathcal{H}_{p}^{\gamma} \hookrightarrow B_{p}^{\gamma, \infty}, \quad \text { if } 1<p<\infty
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\mathcal{H}_{p}^{\gamma}$ is the potential space normed by

$$
\|f\|_{\mathcal{H}_{p}^{\gamma}}:=\left\|\left(\left(1+|\cdot|^{2}\right)^{\gamma / 2} \widehat{f}\right)^{\vee}\right\|_{L_{p}}, \quad \gamma \geq 0,1<p<\infty .
$$

Definition 2.2. Let $1 \leq p \leq \infty$ and let $\left.\left(\phi_{h}\right)_{h \in(0 . .} h_{0}\right]$ be a family in $\mathcal{L}_{p}$. We say that the ladder $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $\gamma>0$ if there exists $c<\infty$ such that

$$
\operatorname{dist}\left(f, S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right) ; L_{p}\right) \leq c h^{\gamma}\|f\|_{B_{p}^{\gamma, 1}(\eta)}, \quad \forall h \in\left(0 \ldots h_{0}\right], f \in B_{p}^{\gamma, 1}
$$

We mention that it is a straightforward matter to show that if $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $\gamma \Gamma$ then

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \operatorname{dist}\left(f, S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right) ; L_{p}\right)=O\left(h^{\lambda}\right) \text { as } h \rightarrow 0 \quad \forall f \in B_{p}^{\lambda, \infty}, 0<\lambda<\gamma \\
& \operatorname{dist}\left(f, S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right) ; L_{p}\right)=O\left(h^{\gamma}|\log h|\right) \text { as } h \rightarrow 0 \quad \forall f \in B_{p}^{\gamma, \infty}
\end{aligned}
$$

Throughout the remainder of this section $\Gamma$ the exponent $\bar{p}$ will lie in the range $1 \leq \bar{p} \leq \infty \Gamma$ the family of functions $\left(\phi_{h}\right)_{h \in\left(0 . . h_{0}\right]}$ will belong to $\mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}} \Gamma \delta$ will lie in $(0 . .2 \pi) \Gamma$ and $\eta$ will be a function in $\widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}}$ which satisfies

$$
\operatorname{supp} \widehat{\eta} \subset \delta C \quad \text { and } \quad \widehat{\eta}=1 \text { on } \frac{1}{2} \delta C,
$$

where $C=\left(-\frac{1}{2} \ldots \frac{1}{2}\right)^{d}$.
The result which forms the foundation of the present paper is the following:

Theorem 2.3. If

$$
\begin{equation*}
\sup _{0<r \leq h} \operatorname{dist}\left(\eta, S_{1}^{h}\left(\phi_{r}\right) ; \mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}\right)=O\left(h^{\gamma}\right) \text { as } h \rightarrow 0 \tag{2.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

then $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $\gamma$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \bar{p}$.
Proof. cf. $\S 6$.
Note that in the stationary case $\Gamma$ a necessary condition for $\left(S_{p}^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ to provide $L_{p^{-}}$ approximation of order $\gamma$ is that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{dist}\left(\eta, S_{p}^{h}(\phi) ; L_{p}\right)=O\left(h^{\gamma}\right) \quad \text { as } h \rightarrow 0 \tag{2.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

Theorem 2.3 says that a condition slightly stronger than (2.5) (in fact $\Gamma$ identical when $p=1$ ) is actually sufficient:

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{dist}\left(\eta, S_{1}^{h}(\phi) ; \mathcal{L}_{p}\right)=O\left(h^{\gamma}\right) \quad \text { as } h \rightarrow 0 \tag{2.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

In the non-stationary case $\Gamma$ condition (2.6) suffices provided it is equipped with a certain downward uniformity as described in (2.4). Once (2.4) has been established $\Gamma$ the fact that we then obtain $L_{p}$-approximation orders for all $1 \leq p \leq \bar{p}$ is a simple consequence of the fact that $\|\cdot\|_{\mathcal{L}_{p}} \leq\|\cdot\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\vec{p}}}$.

With Theorem 2.3 in hand the job of establishing lower bounds on the $L_{p}$-approximation order of $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h} \Gamma 1 \leq p \leq \bar{p} \Gamma$ can be performed by estimating the ability of $S_{1}^{h}\left(\phi_{r}\right)$ to approximate $\eta$ in $\mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}$. One means for this is to choose $s \in S_{1}^{h}\left(\phi_{r}\right)$ so that $\hat{s}=\hat{\eta}$ on $2 \pi C / h \Gamma$ and then conclude that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{dist}\left(\eta, S_{1}^{h}\left(\phi_{r}\right) ; \mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}\right) \leq\|\eta-s\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}} \tag{2.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

This approach yields the following estimates:
Proposition 2.8. Assume that $\widehat{\phi}_{h}\left(h_{0} \cdot\right) \neq 0$ on all of $\delta C, \forall 0<h \leq h_{0}$. Then for $0<r \leq h \leq h_{0}$,

\begin{align*}
& \operatorname{dist}\left(\eta, S_{1}^{h}\left(\phi_{r}\right) ; \mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}\right) \leq\left\|\left(\widehat{\phi}_{r}(h \cdot) \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0} \frac{\widehat{\eta}(\cdot+2 \pi j / h)}{\widehat{\phi}_{r}(h \cdot+2 \pi j)}\right)^{\vee}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}} ;  \tag{1}\\
& \operatorname{dist}\left(\eta, S_{1}^{h}\left(\phi_{r}\right) ; \mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}\right) \leq \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0}\left\|\left(\frac{\widehat{\eta} \widehat{\phi}_{r}(h \cdot+2 \pi j)}{\widehat{\phi}_{r}(h \cdot)}\right)^{\vee}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}} ; \\
& \operatorname{dist}\left(\eta, S_{1}^{h}\left(\phi_{r}\right) ; \mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}\right) \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \eta, \bar{p})\left(\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0}\left\|\frac{\widehat{\phi}_{r}(h \cdot+2 \pi j)}{\widehat{\phi}_{r}(h \cdot)}\right\|_{W_{\bar{q}}^{m}(\delta C)}^{\bar{q}}\right)^{1 / \bar{q}}
\end{align*}
$$

where (3) holds if $2 \leq \bar{p} \leq \infty$ in which case $\bar{q}$ is the exponent conjugate to $\bar{p}$ (i.e. satisfying $1 / \bar{p}+1 / \bar{q}=1$ ) and $m$ is the least integer satisfying $m>d / \bar{q}$.

Proof. cf. $\S 6$.
The proposition is intended to be used in conjunction with Theorem 2.3. The estimate (1) is actually a rewording of (2.7). The estimate (2) derives from (1) simply by pulling the summation outside of the norm. (3) derives from (1) using the crude estimate

$$
\|g\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}} \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \eta, \bar{p})\|\widehat{g}\|_{W_{\frac{m}{q}}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right)} .
$$

In $\S 4$ we will use Theorem 2.3 in conjunction with Proposition 2.8 (2) to investigate the approximation order of non-stationary ladders generated by dilates of the Gaussian $e^{-|\cdot|^{2}}$. In §7 Twe apply Theorem 2.3 in conjunction with Proposition 2.8 (1) to show that in the stationary case $\Gamma$ under certain side conditions $\Gamma$ the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k$ are sufficient to obtain approximation of order $k$. Here is a sample.

Theorem 2.9. Let $\phi \in \mathcal{L}_{\infty}$ satisfy $\widehat{\phi} \in C^{d+1}(\delta C)$ and $\widehat{\phi} \in W_{1}^{d+k}\left(\delta C+2 \pi \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0\right)$. If $\widehat{\phi}(0) \neq 0$ and $\phi$ satisfies the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k$ (1.3), then the stationary ladder $\left(S_{p}^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \infty$.

Proof. cf. §7.
An alternative means for estimating the $\mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}$ distance between $\eta$ and $S_{1}^{h}\left(\phi_{r}\right)$ is to take existing results for convergence in $L_{\bar{p}}$ and then show that when the approximand is $\eta \Gamma$ the convergence is actually in $\mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}$. Since $\eta \in \widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}}$ decays rapidly it is not surprising that the $L_{\bar{p}}$ convergence can be lifted to $\mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}$ if the approximation scheme is sufficiently local (condition (i) below).

Theorem 2.10. Assume that there exists $\psi_{h} \in S_{1}\left(\phi_{h}\right), h \in\left(0 . . h_{0}\right]$, such that for some $N \in \mathbb{N}$ and $c_{1}, c_{2}<\infty$,

& \left|\psi_{h}(x)\right| \leq c_{1}(1+|x|)^{-(d+\gamma)}, \quad \forall x \in \mathbb{R}^{d}, h \in\left(0 . . h_{0}\right]  \tag{i}\\
& \left\|f-\psi_{r} *_{h}^{\prime} f\right\|_{L_{\bar{p}}} \leq c_{2}\|f\|_{N} h^{\gamma}, \quad \forall 0<r \leq h \leq h_{0}, f \in C_{c}^{\infty}, \\
& \text { where }\|f\|_{N}:=\max _{|\alpha| \leq N} \max _{x \in \mathbb{R}^{d}}\left(1+|x|^{2}\right)^{N}\left|\left(D^{\alpha} f\right)(x)\right| .
\end{align*}
$$

Then

$$
\sup _{0<r \leq h} \operatorname{dist}\left(\eta, S_{1}^{h}\left(\phi_{r}\right) ; \mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}\right)=O\left(h^{\gamma}\right) \quad \text { as } h \rightarrow 0 .
$$

Hence, by Theorem 2.3, $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $\gamma$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \bar{p}$.
Proof. cf. $\S 6$.
By employing an error analysis like that of [8] in order to verify condition (ii) of Theorem 2.10 Twe obtain the following result (compare with Theorem 1.4).

Theorem 2.11. Let $2 \leq \bar{p} \leq \infty$ and let $\bar{q}$ be the exponent conjugate to $\bar{p}$ (i.e. satisfying $1 / \bar{p}+1 / \bar{q}=1)$. If there exists $c, \varepsilon \in(0 \ldots \infty)$ such that
(iii) $A(\delta, \gamma, \bar{q}):=\sup _{h \in\left(0 . . h_{0}\right]}\left(\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0}\left\|\frac{\widehat{\phi}_{h}(\cdot+2 \pi j)}{h^{\gamma}+|\cdot|^{\gamma}}\right\|_{L_{\infty}(\delta C)}^{\bar{q}}\right)^{1 / \bar{q}}<\infty$,
then $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $\gamma$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \bar{p}$.
Here $\Gamma\lceil\gamma\rceil$ denotes the least integer greater or equal to $\gamma$. In $\S 3 \Gamma$ using Theorem 2.10 and Theorem 2.11 as well as results from [28]Г[31] Гand [20] Гwe will determine exactly the $L_{p}$-approximation order of exponential box splines for $1 \leq p \leq \infty$.

## 3. Exponential Box Splines

Example 3.1. Let $\Xi$ be a multiset of directions in $\mathbb{R}^{d} \backslash 0$ whose span covers all of $\mathbb{R}^{d} \Gamma$ and let $\lambda \in \mathbb{C}^{\Xi}$. The family of exponential box splines $\phi_{h} \Gamma h \geq 0 \Gamma$ is then defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
\widehat{\phi}_{h}:=\prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \omega_{\xi}^{h}, \quad \text { where } \omega_{\xi}^{h}(x):=\int_{0}^{1} e^{\left(h \lambda_{\xi}-i \xi \cdot x\right) t} d t \tag{3.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

We will show that for all $1 \leq p \leq \infty \Gamma$ the $L_{p}$-approximation order of $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ is exactly $k^{\prime}$ defined by

$$
\begin{aligned}
& K_{j}:=\{\xi \in \Xi: \xi \cdot j \in \mathbb{Z} \backslash 0\}, \quad j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0 ; \\
& k^{\prime}:=\min \left\{\# K_{j}: j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0\right\} .
\end{aligned}
$$

For a general reference on box splines $\Gamma$ the reader is referred to [6]. Actually $\Gamma$ most of the claim in 3.1 is already known in its essence (i.e. in the sense of 1.1). The case when $\Xi$ is confined to integral directions and $\lambda=0$ has been settled in the work of [5]. The works of $[27] \Gamma[13] \Gamma$ and $[24]$ treat the case of integral $\Xi$ and general $\lambda$. For $p=\infty \Gamma[31]$ and [28] have settled the case of general $\Xi$ and $\lambda=0$. [8] Гalso working with $p=\infty \Gamma$ established the upper bound on the approximation order for general $\Xi$ and general $\lambda$. They provided the lower bound in case $\phi_{0}$ was sufficiently smooth and the directions in $\Xi$ were rational (while $\lambda$ is still general). [30] considers rational $\Xi$ and general $\lambda$. For $p=2 \Gamma$ both the lower bound and the upper bound is established. The lower bound on the approximation order is established for $2<p \leq \infty$ excepting that in case $p=\infty$ it is required that $\widehat{\phi}_{0} \in L_{1}$. [20] established the upper bound on the approximation order for general $\Xi$ and general $\lambda$ for $1 \leq p \leq \infty$. After completing the work on this exampleГI learned that Kyriazis [22] has extended the techniques of [21] to include some non-stationary ladders of PSI spaces. For $1<p<\infty$ The establishes the lower bound for rational $\Xi$ and general $\lambda$ under the assumption that $\widehat{\phi}_{0} \in L_{1}$.

The remainder of this section is devoted to proving the claim in 3.1. Since we are assuming that the directions in $\Xi \operatorname{span} \mathbb{R}^{d}$ it follows that $\phi_{h}$ is a piecewise-exponential polynomial function supported in $\Xi[0 \ldots 1]^{m} \Gamma$ where $m:=\# \Xi$ (cf. [27]). Also $\Gamma$ as a distribution $\Gamma \phi_{h}$ has the following representation:

$$
\int_{\mathbb{R}^{d}} \phi_{h} f d m=\int_{[0 . .1]^{m}} e^{h \lambda \cdot t} f(\Xi t) d t, \quad f \in C_{c}^{\infty}
$$

It was shown in [20] that for all $f \in \widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}} \backslash 0 \Gamma$

$$
\operatorname{dist}\left(f, \mathcal{S}_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right) ; L_{p}\right) \neq o\left(h^{k^{\prime}}\right) \quad \text { as } h \rightarrow 0
$$

where $\mathcal{S}_{p}\left(\phi_{h}\right)$ is defined in [20]. For $1 \leq p<\infty \Gamma \mathcal{S}_{p}\left(\phi_{h}\right)$ is defined to be the closure in $L_{p}$ of the finite linear span of the integer shifts of $\phi_{h}$. Consequently $\Gamma S_{p}\left(\phi_{h}\right)$ is contained in $\mathcal{S}_{p}\left(\phi_{h}\right)$ for $1 \leq p<\infty$. For $p=\infty$ it was shown [20; prop.2.2] that $S_{\infty}(\phi) \subset \mathcal{S}_{\infty}(\phi)$ whenever $\phi$ satisfies

$$
\begin{equation*}
\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}}\|\phi\|_{L_{\infty}(j+C)}<\infty \tag{3.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

Since $\phi_{h}$ is bounded and compactly supported $\Gamma$ (3.3) holds and we conclude that for all $f \in \widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}} \backslash 0$ and $1 \leq p \leq \infty \Gamma$

$$
\operatorname{dist}\left(f, S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right) ; L_{p}\right) \neq o\left(h^{k^{\prime}}\right) \quad \text { as } h \rightarrow 0
$$

Thus we need only concern ourselves with the task of showing that $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k^{\prime}$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \infty$. Since this task is vacuous when $k^{\prime}=0 \Gamma$ we may assume that $k^{\prime}>0$.
Lemma 3.4.

$$
\left\|\phi_{h}-\phi_{0}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\infty}} \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi) h, \quad \forall h \in\left[0 \ldots h_{0}\right]
$$

Proof. Since $\operatorname{supp} \phi_{h} \subset \Xi[0 \ldots 1]^{m}$ for all $h \geq 0$ Гit suffices to show that

$$
\left\|\phi_{h}-\phi_{0}\right\|_{L_{\infty}} \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi) h, \quad \forall h \in\left[0 \ldots h_{0}\right] .
$$

Recall that for any piecewise continuous function $g \Gamma$

$$
\|g\|_{L_{\infty}}=\sup \left\{\left|\int_{\mathbb{R}^{d}} g f d m\right|: f \in C_{c}^{\infty}, f \geq 0 \text { and }\|f\|_{L_{1}}=1\right\}
$$

So let $f \in C_{c}^{\infty}$ be such that $f \geq 0$ and $\|f\|_{L_{1}}=1$. Then

\begin{aligned}
& \left|\int_{\mathbb{R}^{d}}\left(\phi_{h}-\phi_{0}\right) f d m\right|=\left|\int_{[0 . .1]^{m}}\left(e^{h \lambda \cdot t}-1\right) f(\Xi t) d t\right| \\
& \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \lambda) h \int_{[0 . .1]^{m}} f(\Xi t) d t \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \lambda) h\left\|\phi_{0}\right\|_{L_{\infty}}=\operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi) h
\end{aligned}
$$

Note that as a consequence of the above lemmar we have that $\left\|\phi_{h}\right\|_{L_{\infty}}$ is bounded independently of $h \in\left[0 . . h_{0}\right]$.

In order to consider first an easier case $\Gamma$ assume (for the time being) that $k^{\prime}=1$. We will be applying Theorem 2.10 so let $\bar{p}:=\infty$ and $\gamma:=1$. It is known (cf. [31] and [28; th.2.8]) that

\left\|f-\phi_{0} *_{h}^{\prime} f\right\|_{L_{\infty}} \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \Xi) h\|f\|_{W_{\infty}^{1}}, \quad \forall f \in W_{\infty}^{1} . \tag{3.5}
\end{equation*}

Let $\psi_{h}:=\phi_{h} \Gamma h \in\left[0 . h_{0}\right]$. That $\psi_{h} \in S_{1}\left(\phi_{h}\right)$ is of course trivial $\Gamma$ and since the functions $\phi_{h}$ as well as their supports are bounded independently of $h \in\left[0 . . h_{0}\right] \Gamma$ it follows that condition (i) of Theorem 2.10 is satisfied. In order to verify condition (ii) $\Gamma$ let $f \in C_{c}^{\infty}$. ThenTfor $0<r \leq h \leq h_{0} \Gamma$

\begin{aligned}
& \left\|f-\psi_{r} *_{h}^{\prime} f\right\|_{L_{\infty}} \leq\left\|f-\phi_{0} *_{h}^{\prime} f\right\|_{L_{\infty}}+\left\|\left(\phi_{0}-\phi_{r}\right) *_{h}^{\prime} f\right\|_{L_{\infty}} \\
& \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \Xi) h\|f\|_{W_{\infty}^{1}}+\left\|\phi_{0}-\phi_{r}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\infty}}\|f\|_{L_{\infty}}, \quad \text { by }(3.5) \text { and Lemma } 5.1 \Gamma \\
& \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi) h\|f\|_{1} \quad \text { by Lemma } 3.4 \text { as } r \leq h .
\end{aligned}
$$

Thus condition (ii) of Theorem 2.10 is satisfied with $N:=1$ and we conclude therefore that $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k^{\prime}=1$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \infty$.

We turn now to the more difficult case $k^{\prime}>1$ where we will apply Theorem 2.11 with $\gamma:=k^{\prime}$ and $\bar{p}:=\infty$. It follows from (3.2) that there exists $\delta \in(0 \ldots \pi)$ and $h_{0} \in(0 \ldots 1] \Gamma$ depending only on $(d, \lambda, \Xi) \Gamma$ such that

& \left|\widehat{\phi}_{h}(x)\right|>\delta, \quad \forall x \in \delta C, h \in\left[0 \ldots h_{0}\right], \quad \text { and }  \tag{3.6}\\
& \left|h \lambda_{\xi}-i \xi \cdot x\right|<1 \quad \forall x \in \delta C, h \in\left[0 \ldots h_{0}\right], \xi \in \Xi .
\end{align*}
$$

In particular $\Gamma$ condition (ii) of Theorem 2.11 is satisfied. Since the functions $\phi_{h}$ as well as their supports are bounded independently of $h \in\left[0 . . h_{0}\right]$ Ccondition (i) of Theorem 2.11 is satisfied.

In showing that condition (iii) of Theorem 2.11 is satisfied $\Gamma$ we will be following the approach taken in the Box Spline section of [8]. There $\Gamma A\left(\delta, k^{\prime}, 1\right)<\infty$ was established only when $\phi_{0}$ was sufficiently smooth and $\Xi$ was rational. Later $\Gamma$ the sufficiently smooth aspect was identified [30] as being when $\widehat{\phi}_{0} \in L_{1}$. The following proposition can be used to show that $\widehat{\phi}_{0} \in L_{1}$ whenever $k^{\prime}>1$.
Proposition 3.7. If $k^{\prime}>1$, then

$$
\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0} \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{1}{1+|\xi \cdot j|}<\infty .
$$

Proof. cf. §8.
The following lemma and its proof are taken almost directly from [8]. By placing $1+|\xi \cdot j|$ in the denominator of our estimate (instead of $|\xi \cdot j|$ as in [8] and [30]) we get by without assuming $\Xi$ to be rational.

Lemma 3.8. For all $j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0, h \in\left[0 \ldots h_{0}\right]$, and $x \in \delta C$,

\left|\omega_{\xi}^{h}(x+2 \pi j)\right| \leq \frac{\operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi)}{1+|\xi \cdot j|} \begin{cases}1, & \xi \in \Xi \backslash K_{j} \\ h+|x|, & \xi \in K_{j} .\end{cases}
$$

Proof. Fix $j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0 \Gamma \xi \in \Xi \Gamma h \in\left[0 \ldots h_{0}\right]$ and $x \in \delta C$. Note that

\omega_{\xi}^{h}(x+2 \pi j)= \begin{cases}1, & \text { if } h \lambda_{\xi}-i \xi \cdot x=2 \pi i \xi \cdot j \\ \frac{e^{h \lambda_{\xi}-i \xi \cdot(x+2 \pi j)}-1}{h \lambda_{\xi}-i \xi \cdot x-2 \pi i \xi \cdot j}, & \text { otherwise } .\end{cases}
$$

Also $\operatorname{lby}$ (3.2) and (3.6) $\left|\omega_{\xi}^{h}(x+2 \pi j)\right| \leq e$.
Case 1. $\xi \in \Xi \backslash K_{j}$.
If $|\xi \cdot j| \leq 1 \Gamma$ then the Lemma holds with $\operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi) \geq 2 e$. If on the other hand $\Gamma$ $|\xi \cdot j|>1 \Gamma$ then $h \lambda_{\xi}-i \xi \cdot x \neq 2 \pi i \xi \cdot j$ and hence

& \left|\omega_{\xi}^{h}(x+2 \pi j)\right| \leq \frac{e^{\left|h \lambda_{\xi}\right|}+1}{|2 \pi \xi \cdot j|-1} \leq \frac{e+1}{(2 \pi-2)|\xi \cdot j|+2|\xi \cdot j|-1} \\
& \leq \frac{e+1}{(2 \pi-2)|\xi \cdot j|+1} \leq \frac{\operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi)}{1+|\xi \cdot j|} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Case 2. $\xi \in K_{j}$.
By (3.6) $\Gamma h \lambda_{\xi}-i \xi \cdot x \neq 2 \pi i \xi \cdot j$; hence $\Gamma$

\begin{aligned}
& \left|\omega_{\xi}^{h}(x+2 \pi j)\right| \leq \frac{\left|e^{h \lambda_{\xi}-i \xi \cdot x}-1\right|}{2 \pi|\xi \cdot j|-1} \\
& \leq \frac{\operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi)(h+|x|)}{(2 \pi-2)|\xi \cdot j|+1} \leq \frac{\operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi)(h+|x|)}{1+|\xi \cdot j|} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Thus proving the lemma.
Therefore Tby (3.2) and Lemma $3.8 \Gamma$

& \left|\widehat{\phi}_{h}(x+2 \pi j)\right| \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi)(h+|x|)^{\# K_{j}} \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{1}{1+|\xi \cdot j|} \\
& \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi)\left(h^{k^{\prime}}+|x|^{k^{\prime}}\right) \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{1}{1+|\xi \cdot j|}, \quad \forall x \in \delta C, j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0 .
\end{aligned}
$$

Hence $\Gamma$ with Proposition 3.7 in view $\Gamma$

$$
A\left(\delta, k^{\prime}, 1\right) \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \lambda, \Xi) \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0} \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{1}{1+|\xi \cdot j|}<\infty .
$$

Thus establishing condition (iii) of Theorem 2.11. Therefore ${ }^{\text {(by }}$ Theorem 2.11 $\Gamma\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k^{\prime}$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \infty$.

## 4. The Gauss kernel

Example 4.1. For $h \in(0 \ldots 1] \Gamma$ define $\phi_{h}$ by

$$
\widehat{\phi}_{h}(x):=e^{-\mu(h)|x|^{2} / 4 \pi^{2}}, \quad \text { where } \mu(h):=\gamma \log (e / h)
$$

for some $\gamma>0$. We will show that the $L_{p}$-approximation order of $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ is exactly $\gamma$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \infty$.

That $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $\gamma$ (in $\Gamma$ say $\Gamma$ the sense of (1.1)) is known for $p=\infty$ and $p=2$. For the precise details see $[3] \Gamma[8 ; \operatorname{th} .3 .8](p=\infty)$ and $[29$; $\operatorname{cor} 2.35](p=2)$. As for the upper bound on the approximation order $\Gamma$ it was shown in [20] that there exists $f \in \widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}} \backslash 0$ such that

$$
\operatorname{dist}\left(f, \mathcal{S}_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right) ; L_{p}\right) \neq o\left(h^{\gamma}\right) \quad \text { as } h \rightarrow 0
$$

where $\mathcal{S}_{p}\left(\phi_{h}\right)$ is defined in [20]. As mentioned in the discussion prior to (3.3) $\Gamma S_{p}\left(\phi_{h}\right) \subset$ $\mathcal{S}_{p}\left(\phi_{h}\right)$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \infty$ (as (3.3) holds in case $p=\infty$ ). Hence the $L_{p}$-approximation order of $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ cannot exceed $\gamma$.

The task of showing that $\left(S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $\gamma$ is simplified by making use of the tensor product nature of $\phi_{h}$ and by employing the following:
Lemma 4.2. Let $f_{i} \in \mathcal{L}_{\infty}(\mathbb{R}), i=1,2, \ldots, d$, be continuous and define $f(x):=f_{1}\left(x_{1}\right) f_{2}\left(x_{2}\right) \cdots f_{d}\left(x_{d}\right), x \in \mathbb{R}^{d}$. Then

$$
\|f\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right)} \leq \prod_{i=1}^{d}\left\|f_{i}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\infty}(\mathbb{R})}
$$

Proof. The lemma is clear when $d=1$. Proceeding by induction Гassume the lemma to be true for $d^{\prime}=d-1$ and consider $d$. Let $x \in \mathbb{R}^{d}$. Then

\begin{aligned}
& \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}}|f(x+j)|=\sum_{k \in \mathbb{Z}^{d-1}}\left|f_{1}\left(x_{1}+k_{1}\right) f_{2}\left(x_{2}+k_{2}\right) \cdots f_{d-1}\left(x_{d-1}+k_{d-1}\right)\right| \sum_{n \in \mathbb{Z}}\left|f_{d}\left(x_{d}+n\right)\right| \\
& \leq\left(\prod_{i=1}^{d-1}\left\|f_{i}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\infty}(\mathbb{R})}\right) \sum_{n \in \mathbb{Z}}\left|f_{d}\left(x_{d}+n\right)\right|, \quad \text { by induction hypothesis } \\
& \leq\left(\prod_{i=1}^{d}\left\|f_{i}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}_{\infty}(\mathbb{R})}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

which proves the lemma.
Let $\tau \in C^{\infty}(\mathbb{R})$ be supported in $(-1 \ldots 1)$ and be such that $\tau=1$ on $[-1 / 2 \ldots 1 / 2]$. & \leq d \sum_{k \in \mathbb{Z} \backslash 0} a(k) \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}-1} \prod_{i=1}^{d-1} a\left(j_{i}\right)=d\left(\sum_{k \in \mathbb{Z}} a(k)\right)^{d-1} \sum_{k \in \mathbb{Z} \backslash 0} a(k) .

## 5. Some useful lemmata

In this section we march out a few results which will be useful in proving our main results. At the outset of the introduction $\Gamma$ we mentioned a result of [19]. It can be stated in slightly more generality as follows:
Lemma 5.1. Let $1 \leq p \leq \infty$ and let $\phi \in \mathcal{\mathcal { L } _ { p }}$. Then

The following lemma gives an estimate of the $\mathcal{L}_{p}$ norm of a function $g$ in terms of $\widehat{g}$ for $2 \leq p \leq \infty$.

Lemma 5.2. Let $2 \leq p \leq \infty$ and let $q$ be the exponent conjugate to $p$ (i.e. satisfying $\frac{1}{p}+\frac{1}{q}=1$ ). Let $m$ be the least integer satisfying $m>d / q$. Then

& \leq \operatorname{const}(d, p)\left\|\left(\left\|(1+|\cdot|)^{m} g\right\|_{L_{p}(j+C)}\right)_{j}\right\|_{\ell_{p}\left(\mathbb{Z}^{d}\right)}=\operatorname{const}(d, p)\left\|(1+|\cdot|)^{m} g\right\|_{L_{p}} .

By the Hausdorff-Young theorem (cf. [23; p.142]) Г

The following lemmata show how the semi-discrete convolution acts in the Fourier transformed domain.

Lemma 5.7. Let $\phi \in \widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}}$, and let $f$ be a tempered distribution such that supp $\widehat{f}$ is compact. Then for all $h>0$,

The assumption that $\phi \in \widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}}$ above is too strong for most purposes. It can be relaxed provided we further restrict $f$.
Lemma 5.10. Let $\phi \in L_{1}$. If $f \in L_{1}$ and $\operatorname{supp} \hat{f}$ is compact, then for all $h>0$,

There exists a sufficiently large $n \in \mathbb{N}$ such that $\operatorname{supp} \widehat{f} \subset n \pi 2 C$. Hence $\Gamma$ by Lemma $5.6 \Gamma$

Lemma 5.11 (Wiener's Lemma). Let $f, g \in L_{1}$ be such that supp $\widehat{f}$ is compact and $\widehat{g}(x) \neq 0$ for all $x \in \operatorname{supp} \hat{f}$. Then

In the following lemmaГa description is given for a multi-level approximation scheme employing the dilated shifts of a function $\eta$. In subsequent theorems $\Gamma$ this approximation scheme will be used except that $\eta$ will be replaced by a suitable approximation of $\eta$ drawn from dilates of $S_{1}\left(\phi_{h}\right)$.

Lemma 5.12. Let $1 \leq p \leq \infty$, and let $\eta \in \widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}}$ and $\delta \in(0 . .2 \pi)$ be such that supp $\widehat{\eta} \subset \delta C$ and $\widehat{\eta}=1$ on $\frac{1}{2} \delta C$. For $h \in(0.1]$, let $n:=n(h)$ be the largest integer for which $2^{n} h \leq 1$. Let $\gamma>0$. For $f \in B_{p}^{\gamma, 1}$, let $\left\{f_{k}\right\}_{k \in \mathbb{Z}_{+}}$be as in (2.1). Then for all $h \in(0 . .1]$

## 6. The Proofs of the Main Results

In this section $\Gamma$ we prove Theorem $2.3 \Gamma$ Proposition $2.8 \Gamma$ Theorem $2.10 \Gamma$ and Theoerm 2.11. The technique used in proving Theorem 2.3 might well be called approximation by replacement. In order to approximate $f \in L_{p}$ from $S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right) \Gamma$ we start with a very good approximation to $f$ written using various dilates of the shifts of a certain function $\eta$ (i.e. the scheme described in Lemma 5.12). By replacing each instance of $\eta$ with an approximation to $\eta$ from an appropriate dilate of $S_{1}\left(\phi_{h}\right) \Gamma$ we then obtain an approximation to $f$ from $S_{p}^{h}\left(\phi_{h}\right)$ whose closeness to $f$ can be estimated in terms of how well each replacement actually approximates $\eta$. It turns out that these replacements need to approximate $\eta$ not in $L_{p} \Gamma$ but rather in $\mathcal{L}_{p}$. This is because $\eta$ appears in expressions like $\eta *^{\prime} a \Gamma a \in \ell_{p} \Gamma$ where the smallness of $\|\psi-\eta\|_{L_{p}}$ does not ensure the smallness (relative to $\|a\|_{\ell_{p}}$ ) of $\left\|(\psi-\eta) *^{\prime} a\right\|_{L_{p}}$. Whereas the smallness of $\|\psi-\eta\|_{\mathcal{L}_{p}}$ does. ## 7. The Strang-Fix conditions

In this section we address the task of finding reasonable side conditions under which it can be proven that if $\phi$ satisfies the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k$ and $\widehat{\phi}(0) \neq 0 \Gamma$ then $\left(S^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k$. For example $\Gamma$ in Theorem 1.4 (by Jia and Lei) it is proven that under conditions (i) and (ii) of Theorem 1.4「the Strang-Fix conditions guarantee "controlled" $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \infty$. The problem with the strong decay assumption of condition (i) is that it implies that $\hat{\phi}$ is globally smooth; whereas in some applications $\bar{\phi}$ is only smooth away from the origin. It is thus desirable to find side conditions which do not require $\widehat{\phi}$ to be smooth near the origin. This was achieved for $p=2$ by de Boor $\Gamma$ DeVore $\Gamma$ and Ron in [4]. In order to state their result we introduce the potential spaces

We also need local versions of these spaces. If $\rho$ is an integer and $\Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^{d}$ is open $\Gamma$ then $W_{2}^{\rho}(\Omega)$ is simply the Sobolev space defined in $\S 1$. It is fairly easy to see by the Plancherel Theorem (cf. [32; th.7.9]) that $W_{2}^{\rho}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right)=W_{2}^{\rho}$ and that their norms are equivalent. In this case $\left(\rho \in \mathbb{Z}_{+}\right) \Gamma$ if $\left\{\Omega_{\beta}\right\}_{\beta}$ is a collection of disjoint open sets $\Gamma$ then with $\Omega:=\cup_{\beta} \Omega_{\beta}$

For non-integer $\rho$ Гthere are several equivalent ways of defining $W_{2}^{\rho}(\Omega)$ (cf. [1; ch.7]) so that $W_{2}^{\rho}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right)=W_{2}^{\rho}$ (with equivalent norms). In this case we have the subadditive property:

Theorem 7.2. Let $\phi \in L_{2}$ and $k \in \mathbb{N}$. Assume that $\widehat{\phi} \in W_{2}^{\rho}\left(\delta C+2 \pi \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0\right)$ and $\widehat{\phi}>\varepsilon$ a.e. on $\delta C$ for some $\delta, \varepsilon>0$ and $\rho>k+d / 2$. If $\phi$ satisfies the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k$, then the stationary ladder $\left(S^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{2}$-approximation of order $k$.

Proof. cf. [4; th.5.14].
Note that the side condition $\Gamma \hat{\phi} \in W_{2}^{\rho}\left(\delta C+2 \pi \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0\right) \Gamma$ does not impose any smoothness on $\widehat{\phi}$ near the origin and is implied by a strong decay of $\phi$ (e.g. condition (i) of Theorem 1.4).

There have been other attempts to give side conditions under which the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k$ and $\widehat{\phi}(0) \neq 0$ imply $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k$ (say $\Gamma$ in the sense of (1.1)). Namely $\Gamma[8 ;$ th.3.5] $(p=\infty)$ and $[21 ;$ th.3.9 $(2 \leq p<\infty)$ and th.4.8 $(1<p<\infty)]$. When $2<p \leq \infty$ the above mentioned results are successful in that their side conditions
require no smoothness of $\widehat{\phi}$ near the origin $ا$ but fall short of the standard established by [4] in that their side conditions are not implied by a strong decay of $\phi$. The side conditions of [21; th.4.8] require a smoothness (increasing with $k$ ) of $\widehat{\phi}$ near the origin and are not implied by a strong decay of $\phi$.

We state now the present contributions which derive from Theorem 2.3 in conjunction with Proposition 2.8 (1).
Theorem 7.3. Let $\bar{p} \in\{1,2\}$. Let $\phi \in \mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}$ and $k \in \mathbb{N}$ be such that $\widehat{\phi} \in W_{2}^{\rho}\left(\varepsilon C+2 \pi \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0\right)$ for some $\varepsilon \in(0 . .2 \pi)$ and $\rho>k+d / 2$. In case $\bar{p}=2$ assume additionally that $\widehat{\phi} \in C^{m}(\varepsilon C)$ where $m$ is the least integer satisfying $m>d / 2$. If $\widehat{\phi}(0) \neq 0$ and $\phi$ satisfies the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k(1.3)$, then the stationary ladder $\left(S_{p}^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \bar{p}$.

Note that the case $\bar{p}=1$ is very satisfactory in that the side conditions impose no smoothness assumption on $\widehat{\phi}$ near the origin and they are implied by a strong decay of $\phi$ (e.g. condition (i) of Theorem 1.4). However $\Gamma$ for the case $\bar{p}=2 \Gamma$ we do impose a (fixed) smoothness assumption on $\widehat{\phi}$ near the origin. Nonetheless $\Gamma$ the side conditions are implied by a sufficiently strong decay of $\phi$ (e.g. if $k>d / 2 \Gamma$ then condition (i) of Theorem 1.4 suffices).

Our result for the case $2<\bar{p} \leq \infty$ is as follows.
Theorem 7.4. Let $2<\bar{p} \leq \infty$ and let $\bar{q}$ be the exponent conjugate to $\bar{p}$ (i.e. satisfying $1 / \bar{p}+1 / \bar{q}=1$ ). Let $m$ be the least integer greater than $d / \bar{q}$. Let $k \in \mathbb{N}$ and define

Let $\phi \in \mathcal{L}_{\bar{p}}$ satisfy $\widehat{\phi} \in C^{m}(\varepsilon C)$ and $\widehat{\phi} \in W_{\bar{q}}^{\rho}\left(\varepsilon C+2 \pi \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0\right)$ for some $\varepsilon>0$. If $\widehat{\phi}(0) \neq 0$ and $\phi$ satisfies the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k$ (1.3), then the stationary ladder $\left(S_{p}^{h}(\phi)\right)_{h}$ provides $L_{p}$-approximation of order $k$ for all $1 \leq p \leq \bar{p}$.

Note that the side conditions impose a (fixed) smoothness assumption of $\widehat{\phi}$ near the origin $\Gamma$ and they are not implied by a strong decay of $\phi$.

Proof of Theorem 7.3 and Theorem 7.4. In case $\bar{p} \in\{1,2\} \Gamma$ put $\bar{q}:=2$. Assume that $\phi$ satisfies the Strang-Fix conditions of order $k$ and $\widehat{\phi}(0) \neq 0$. Then there exists $\delta \in(0 . . \varepsilon)$ such that $\widehat{\phi} \neq 0$ on all of $\delta C$. Let $\eta \in \widehat{C_{c}^{\infty}}$ satisfy supp $\widehat{\eta} \subset \delta C$ and $\widehat{\eta}=1$ on $\frac{1}{2} \delta C$. Then the hypothesis of Proposition 2.8 is satisfied and the estimate (1) reduces to

The notation used in the following lemma is of course a silly abstraction of the hypothesis of Theorem 3.7; it serves simply to disarm the usual $d$-tuple representation of $\mathbb{R}^{d}$ which $\Gamma$ in the present situation Conly gets in the way.
Lemma 8.1. Let $X$ be a d dimensional Hilbert Space over $\mathbb{R}$. Let $\Xi$ be a finite multiset of linear functionals defined on $X$, and suppose that

& =\frac{1 / 3}{\left(1+\left|\xi_{0} \cdot t \tau\right|^{1-\varepsilon}\right)\left(1+\left|\xi_{1} \cdot t \tau\right|^{2 \varepsilon}\right)} \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{3}{1+|\xi \cdot x|^{1-3 \varepsilon}}, \\
& \leq \operatorname{const}\left(\Xi, \tau, \xi_{0}, \xi_{1}\right) \frac{1}{1+t^{1+\varepsilon} f_{3 \varepsilon}(x ; \Xi) .}
\end{aligned}
$$

Therefore $\Gamma$

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \int_{0}^{\infty} \int_{\partial \Omega \cap H} f_{\varepsilon}(t \tau+x ; \Xi) d m_{d-1}(x) d t \\
& \leq \operatorname{const}\left(\Xi, \tau, \xi_{0}, \xi_{1}\right) \int_{0}^{\infty} \frac{1}{1+t^{1+\varepsilon}} \int_{\partial \Omega \cap H} f_{3 \varepsilon}(x ; \Xi) d m_{d-1}(x) d t<\infty, \quad \text { by }(8.7)
\end{aligned}
$$

Thus $\Gamma$ in view of (8.8) and (8.6) $\Gamma$ the lemma is proved.

Lemma 8.11. For all $x \in \mathbb{R}^{d}$,

$$
\inf \left\{|n x-j|: n \in \mathbb{N} \text { and } j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}\right\}=0
$$

Proof. For $x \in \mathbb{R}^{d} \Gamma$ let $C(x)$ be the unique element of $[-1 / 2 \ldots 1 / 2)^{d}$ such that $x-C(x) \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}$. Note that

$$
|C(x)|=\inf \left\{|x-j|: j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}\right\}, \quad \forall x \in \mathbb{R}^{d} .
$$

Fix $x \in \mathbb{R}^{d}$ and let $\varepsilon>0$. Since $C(n x) \in[-1 / 2 \ldots 1 / 2]^{d}$ for all $n \in \mathbb{N} \Gamma$ there exists $y \in[-1 / 2 \ldots 1 / 2]^{d}$ and $m, n \in \mathbb{N}$ with $m<n$ such that

$$
|C(m x)-y|+|C(n x)-y|<\varepsilon .
$$

Hence $\Gamma$

|C((n-m) x)| \leq|C(m x)-C(n x)| \leq|C(m x)-y|+|C(n x)-y|<\varepsilon .
$$

Proof of Proposition 3.7. Assume $k^{\prime}(\Xi) \geq 2$. Put $R:=\max _{\xi \in \Xi}|\xi|$ and $\delta:=\frac{1}{2 R}$. We will show first of all that

\#\{\xi \in \Xi: \xi \cdot x \neq 0\} \geq 2, \quad \forall x \in \mathbb{R}^{d} \backslash 0 \tag{8.12}
\end{equation*}
$$

Let $x \in \mathbb{R}^{d} \backslash 0$. By Lemma $8.11 \Gamma$ there exists $n \in \mathbb{N}$ and $j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0$ such that $|n x-j|<\delta$. Now if $\xi \in K_{j} \Gamma$ then $|\xi \cdot j| \geq 1$. Hence $\Gamma$

$$
\begin{aligned}
& |\xi \cdot n x| \geq|\xi \cdot j|-|\xi \cdot(n x-j)| \\
& \geq 1-|\xi||n x-j| \geq 1 / 2
\end{aligned}
$$

Therefore $\Gamma$

$$
\#\{\xi \in \Xi: \xi \cdot x \neq 0\} \geq \# K_{j} \geq 2
$$

Hence $\Gamma$ (8.12). Therefore by Lemma $8.1 \Gamma$

$$
\begin{equation*}
\int_{\mathbb{R}^{d}} \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{d x}{1+|\xi \cdot x|}<\infty \tag{8.13}
\end{equation*}
$$

Now $\Gamma$ if $j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0$ and $x \in j+\delta B \Gamma$ then

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{1}{1+|\xi \cdot j|} \leq \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{1}{1+|\xi \cdot x|-|\xi \cdot(x-j)|} \\
& \leq \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{1}{1 / 2+|\xi \cdot x|} \leq \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{2}{1+|\xi \cdot x|}
\end{aligned}
$$

Therefore $\Gamma$

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0} \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{1}{1+|\xi \cdot j|} \leq \frac{1}{m_{d}(\delta B)} \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}^{d} \backslash 0} \int_{j+\delta B} \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{2}{1+|\xi \cdot x|} d x \\
& \leq \operatorname{const}(d, \delta, \Xi) \int_{\mathbb{R}^{d}} \prod_{\xi \in \Xi} \frac{1}{1+|\xi \cdot x|} d x<\infty \quad \text { by (8.13). }
\end{aligned}
$$
